## Recruitment

- Current process:
- Personal Contact
- Word-of-mouth
- Inclusion of application in area materials
- What more could be done to encourage faculty to become candidates?


## Campaigning

, Current Process:

- Candidate Statements
- One page, all made available as a packet on Friday morning
- Speeches
- Delivered in one time block on Friday morning. Ten minutes for presidential candidates, five for all others.
- Candidate Forums
- One hour forum on Friday afternoon. Includes officers only.
- What could be added or changed to give you more information on the candidates?


## Voting

- Current process:
- One vote per college, one per multi-college district with its own senate, one for each Executive Committee member
- Must have delegate badge
- Ballot disqualified if signature does not match signin
- What could be done differently?


## Trickle-Down

- Elections are held one at a time in a specified order. If a candidate is unsuccessful in one election, he or she may add his or her name to the ballot for the next election

- Pros and Cons for trickle-down process


## Term Length

- One year for officers (president, vicepresident, secretary, treasurer)
- Two years for all others
- Only president has a term limit-two consecutive terms
- What might be changed?
- All one year?
- All two years?
- More term limits?
