Purpose

Desired Outcome

 increased comfort in helping your college successfully meet the standards and provide the best possible education for your students.

Accreditation is a voluntary system of self-regulation developed to evaluate overall educational quality and institutional effectiveness and assures ...

- the public that accredited colleges meet the standards
- education earned is of value to the student
- employers, trade or profession-related licensing agencies, and other colleges and universities can accept a student's credentials as legitimate

Quality Assurance by an External Party or Group



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
Outside of the U.S.

ACCJC



Accrediting Commission for Community and Junior Colleges

The ACCJC assures the educational community, the general public, and other organizations and agencies that an accredited institution . . .

- has clearly defined objectives appropriate to higher education
- has established conditions under which their achievement can reasonably be expected
- appears in fact to be accomplishing them substantially
- is so organized, staffed, and supported that it can be expected to continue to do so
- demonstrates that it meets Accreditation Standards

Elements of the Accreditation Process

Published Set of Standards

Expectations for colleges and districts

Self-Evaluation

 Written reflection of how well institution complies with standards

Peer Review

 Accreditation review conducted primarily by faculty and administrators from peer institutions

Elements of the Accreditation Process Site Visit

 Team of volunteers from peer institutions visits the college and evaluates the accuracy of the selfevaluation


Action

■ The ACCJC makes a determination of status: (re-)affirmation of accreditation, warning, probation, show cause

Monitoring and Oversight

On-going cycle of review (every 6 years), mid-term reports, substantive change reports.



- Descriptive summary
- Self evaluation
 - analyze and systematically evaluate its performance against the Accreditation Standards and its institutional mission.
- Actionable improvement plans
 - •integrated into the institution's continuous evaluation and planning processes.

Provide evidence of ...

- Student achievement
- Student learning outcomes and assessment
- Quality program review
- Quality of student support services
- Financial performance and integrity
- Evidence of compliance with other areas related to federal requirements*

Accreditation Themes

- Institutional commitments
- Evaluation planning and improvement
- Student learning outcomes
- Organization
- Dialogue
- Institutional integrity

New ACCJC Manuals

Beginning with the comprehensive visits in fall 2012, colleges are required to use the new manuals.





Courses and programs are reviewed regularly for usefulness and currency




Student Pathways Are Reviewed
